Doors open at 2.00 pm, not before, please, to let us get the room ready, when tea will be served.

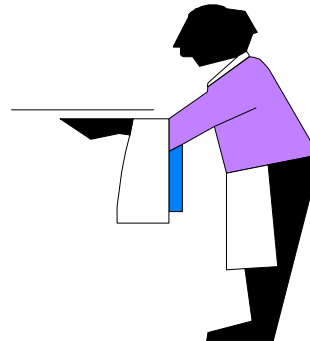
Meetings start at 2.30 pm prompt. Visitors may attend all meetings on payment of £1.50, and membership may be taken out at any meeting.

Details of Pub Lunches are available in the Newsletter, at the monthly general meeting or by calling the above 'phone number.

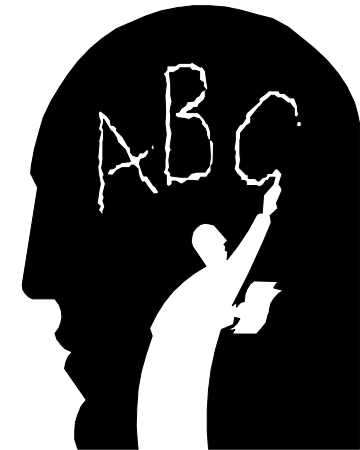

UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AGE



What is U3A?

U3A stands for University of the Third Age, or that period in our lives after childhood and working life, when most of us have finished paid employment, and our families have flown the nest.

Although called a University, we do not seek to offer degrees, but use the term in its original sense, of groups of people wishing to study or discuss a subject.

We take this idea very loosely and include many and various topics, which in some cases are just pure enjoyment, and do not include study at all!

Who are we?

We are people, like yourself, who are interested in making our retirement from paid employment enjoyable and fulfilling - in being able to study or follow various subjects to whatever level we wish, without the stress of taking examinations, in small groups, with like-minded people.

What are we?

Part of a world-wide self-help organisation which has at present over 740 groups spread around the country, comprising over 220,000 members in Great Britain alone, but is also very strong in many other countries. Although started only in October 1994, Enfield U3A has well over 400 members at present, and we are still growing. We cover an area stretching from Palmers Green in one direction to the boundary of Potters Bar and from Chingford to Barnet in the other! We are completely self-governing, but are affiliated to the Third Age Trust, a Charity that looks after the interests of all the local U3A's in this country.

What do we offer?

The list of subjects offered is growing all the time, and is restricted only by the number of group leaders that we have. These, however, do not have to be qualified teachers, although some are - but the main thing that is needed is enthusiasm in a subject, and a wish to help others enjoy it. Indeed, some of our group leaders are "students" in other groups and vice versa!

The subjects offered at present (subject to change and availability) are as follows:-

Appreciating Shakespeare, Art Gallery & Museum visits, Book Club, Bridge, Canal Walks, Cinema Group/Film Visits, Current affairs, Discussion Group, Drawing, Freedom Pass Trips, French (3 Groups), Gardening, Genealogy, German, Handicrafts, Italian, Modern British/European World History (2 Groups), Moving Image Club, Music Appreciation, Philosophy, Photography, Play Reading, Pub Lunches, Rehearsals at the Barbican, Scrabble (3 Groups), Spanish, Singing. Theatre Group, Walking, Writing for fun (2 groups),

We also hold a monthly general meeting at which we usually have a visiting speaker on varying topics. The Third Age Trust publishes a quarterly full-colour magazine, which is posted free to members, together with "Sources" (a free educational magazine), and a lively website. Enfield U3A has its own website, publishes its own quarterly newsletter, obtainable at the monthly meetings, and can also be accessed via the website, and programme. There are also several national Networks covering different subject areas, including travel and organised trips at home and abroad for the purposes of study, etc., and we also run coach trips to

places of interest, and organise day trips and holidays.

What does it cost?

At present the annual subscription is set at £14.00 per member, but this may rise due to increased costs, the only other costs being for any books or learning aids which may be required, and entry to any public exhibitions or the like.

Group concessionary rates are often obtained, sometimes even free, making entrance to many exhibitions open to the public much cheaper than individual entry.

How do I join?

You may attend any monthly meeting at a cost of £1.50 per visit, and if you like what you see, you may join by seeing the Treasurer at any meeting, or please contact us for further information. on 020-8882-3602.

Don't be put off if you find that there isn't a group running a subject in which you may be interested, or if one which is running is full.

Have a word with our Groups co-ordinator at our monthly meeting. A wish list is kept of requests for new groups, and most have been started in this way. We are, after all, a self-help organisation, and have been so for the past fourteen years.
